#### CEO Report Board – March 10, 2025

#### **Legislative Update**

The 2025 Florida Legislative Session begins on Tuesday, March 4 (and ends on May 2<sup>nd</sup>). ELC Broward, along with the Association for Early Learning Coalitions (AELC), have been meeting with local legislators, House and Senate Leadership, legislative aides/staff, and key legislators who have been champions of early learning to educate and advocate for our legislative priorities.

This year ELC Broward's priority is ensuring our SR base funding (for child enrollments) is sufficient to meet the needs of our community. This would require the implementation of a new funding methodology passed during last year's legislative session but not implemented due to a timing. The new methodology requires that SR base allocations be determined by Florida's Office of Economic and Demographic Research (EDR) and shared at an SR Estimating Conference hearing. The new funding methodology considers multiple factors including current and historic enrollments/FTEs for all levels of care, county population, and local provider rate index. Based on drafted funding models using this new methodology, our annual SR base funding would increase. An Estimating Conference was held on March 6<sup>th</sup> where data was shared to inform FY26 funding appropriations.

The AELC is also advocating for an increase in the SR eligibility threshold. Understanding a threshold increase would come with a huge price tag (currently being modeled based on an increase to 200% FPL from 150% or to 65% SMI from 55%), and with legislators being asked by leadership to prioritize funding requests, likely the push this year will focus more on moving away from using the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) and instead using the State Median Income (SMI) to better align the benchmark with Florida's economy. Then in future years the SMI threshold could be increased when funding permits.

This week's companion School Readiness bills HB 659 and SB 1382 were filled reflecting the two priorities mentioned above. Here is an overview:

- Modifies the definition of "economically disadvantaged" to mean a family income not exceeding 65 percent of SMI, rather than 150 percent FPL.
- Clarifies that the uniform waitlist should track potentially eligible children waiting for services based on family household income and priority.
- Modifies the priority levels for the program to include two tiers of income eligibility based on the revised definition
  of "economically disadvantaged".
  - o 50% SMI (\$49,000) = equates to 157% FPL for a family of 4.
  - o 65% SMI (\$63,725) = equates to 204% FPL for a family of 4.
- Codifies the current method for determining each county's allocation of school readiness program funds, including FTE as well as population changes.

#### **School Readiness Enrollment Update**

Based on our recent enrollment freeze, we were projecting our census of SR children to decrease from October's number of 15,275 children to approximately 11,873 by June through attrition of approximately 425 per month. We are happy to report our financial outlook and enrollment numbers for the remainder of the year has shifted significantly. As discussed at the last board meeting, with the allocation of an additional \$6 million from the \$40M funding pool that was being held up in legislature, and with the prospect of additional funding through the re-ob/de-ob process, we have lifted the enrollment. For January we paid for 14,789 children and have started calling families off the waitlist. Last week, we called 363 children from the waitlist. As of March 5, 2025, the number of children on the waitlist for childcare is 2,654.

#### **VPK Update**

As of March 5, 2025, we have approved 14,294 VPK school-year applications (FY 24-25), and we have 12,668 children who have now enrolled in VPK. The Florida Statewide Estimating Conference estimated earlier this year that Broward would have 12,815 school year participants. We will continue to keep you updated throughout the year as to our ability to meet or exceed this estimate.

January 1<sup>st</sup> began the new enrollment period for next school year's VPK programming. To date we have approved 5,878 VPK applications for the next school year.

#### **Great News... Non-Profit Awards Finalist**

On January 28, 2025 finalists were announced for the 14th Annual Community Care Plan Non-Profit Awards hosted by 211 Broward. ELC Broward is a finalist in not one, but TWO categories! One for Non-profit organization of the year for Collaboration, for our work with the A.D. Henderson Foundation, Children's Services Council (Special Needs Assessment Council), Early Steps, and Florida Diagnostic and Learning Resource Systems (FDLRS) to create and implement the Peer Support Specialist role (staffed in ELC's Inclusion Unit). The two Peer Support Specialists now onboard were funded (this year and last) by A.D. Henderson to provide families with hands-on, compassionate guidance navigating the referral and evaluation from someone with firsthand experience of the process.

The second finalist category is for Renee Jaffe as Non-profit leader of the year. The award ceremony is scheduled for March 7, 2025. A big thank you to Zachary Talbot for funding a table at the event so we can attend!

#### **ELC Broward's State of Childcare**

Unfortunately, we had to postpone ELC's State of Childcare event due to a lack of response. We are working on rescheduling later in the fiscal year.

#### **Broward Early Childhood Educators Conference (BECE)**

We are proud to announce our first in-person BECE since the pandemic was a success! 560 childcare educators descended upon Boyd Anderson High School Saturday, February 22, for a full day of workshops, networking, and all-around fun. Thanks so much to our staff, our sponsors, and special thanks to those board members who came out to support the event!

#### **Saying goodbye to Board Members**

We are sad to announce that we are losing three Board members. Monica King and Richart Campillo will reach end of their respective term limits on March 31<sup>st</sup>. Both have served two terms for a total of 8 years. Twan Russell has resigned from the ELC Board due to time constraints.

Please join us in thanking Monica, Rich, and Twan for their dedication, contributions and support as ELC Board members. All three have been an asset in helping to strengthen the organization and board, chaired various committees, and served on the Executive Committee. Their participation and guidance will truly be missed!

#### **Annual Board Survey & Retreat Questionnaire**

However, you must disclose the nature of the conflict before making any attempt to influence the decision, whether orally or in writing and whether made by you or at your direction.

You must complete and file this form (before making any attempt to influence the decision) with the person responsible for recording the

We have audited the financial statements of Early Learning Coalition of Broward County, Inc. (the "Organization") for the year ended June 30, 2024, and have issued our reports thereon dated (DATE). Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, *Government Auditing Standards*, the Uniform Guidance, and Chapter 10.650, Rules of the Auditor General, Florida Single Audit Act, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you date October 11, 2024. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

#### Significant Audit Findings

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by the Organization are described in Note 2 to the financial statements. The Organization adopted the amendments in FASB Accounting Stadards Update ("ASU") 2016-13, Financial Instruments - Credit Losses (Topic 326): Measurements of Credit Losses on Financial Instruments in 2023. The new accounting standard has been applied based on the transition guidance included in FASB ASU 2016-13, which did not have a material impact on the Organization's reported financial results or disclosures. We noted no transactions entered into by the Organization during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The Organization had no sensitive estimates.

There are no financial statement disclosures which are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users.

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

#### Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Management has corrected all such misstatements. In addition, none of the misstatements detected as a result of audit procedures and corrected by management were material, either individually or in the aggregate, to the financial statements taken as a whole.

#### Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements, or the auditor's reports. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

#### Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letters dated (DATE).

#### Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the Organization's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

#### Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the Organization's auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

During our audit we became aware of several matters that are opportunities for strengthening *Information Technology* internal controls and operating efficiency. Please see *Attachment 1* to this letter.

#### Other Matters

With respect to the supplemental information accompanying the financial statements, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content, and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the financial statements. We compared and reconciled the supplemental information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements

themselves.

Management has confirmed to us that the final version of the annual report will be provided to us as soon as available, and prior to its issuance. We will read it and consider whether material inconsistencies exist, on selected amounts or items, between the annual report and the Organization's audited financial statements. We are not responsible for omitted information or for the completeness of the information.

#### **ATTACHMENT 1**

## Information Technology Internal Control Observations and Recommendations

#### 01- User Access Review

The engagement team noted that while a review of users is performed to ensure that all users are active employees of ELC, a review of user entitlements in the network and Abila MIP application is not performed systematically or formally. As such, the reviews are not properly documented to illustrate the involvement of the requestor, reviewer, and timely resolution of revoking inappropriate access. While the access rights of users are reviewed informally, documentation of systemic, timely reviews adds more certainty that transferred employees access is properly updated, terminated employees access is disabled timely, and/or unauthorized access rights are being identified.

Recommendation: The engagement team recommends that management perform a formal and documented review of the network and Abila MIP user entitlements on a regular basis. The formal reviews should be performed by department heads who do not have administrator access based on system reports provided by system administrators and include the following:

- Review account listings to ensure generic/group IDs are appropriate (use of such is strongly discouraged and should be minimized to the extent possible)
- Review individual user access to systems to ensure access is restricted to appropriate functions based on current job responsibilities.
- Review access to powerful privileges, system resources and administrative access to ensure access is restricted to a very limited number of authorized personnel.

The access review should be documented by the department head and evidence retained. Any identified conflicts in access rights should be followed up and resolved in a timely manner.

Management Response: Management agrees with the recommendation and standard operating procedures will be implemented as recommended.

#### 02- Change in IT Systems Management Policies and Procedures

The engagement team noted that ELC does not have a documented IT systems change management policy. IT system management change policies help define the process that changes must follow, ensuring that all changes are performed following proper review, approvals, segregation of duties between developers and implementation teams, and testing. If an IT system management change policy does not make sense due to the size of the organization, then a procedure should be followed

where change details such as the requested change, approvals, and testing are tracked in written form and kept for auditing purposes.

Recommendation: The engagement team recommends that management compose formalized, written procedures related to program maintenance and change management to provide a guideline for the specific practices to be followed when modifying company systems. An effective change management policy should include the following:

- A description of those responsible for program maintenance
- A description of the process by which changes are requested (i.e., who can initiate, who must approve and authorize)
- A description of the process by which approved changes are tested
- A description of the formal evaluation and approval process of test results by management prior to implementing a change
- A description of implementation planning for configurations to applications

If an IT systems change management policy is not drafted then at a minimum management should consider implementing a change tracking mechanism in a written form (e.g. email) and include important attributes of a change such as the requestor, change requested, approvals, test plan, and implementation plan. These emails would serve as change tickets and should be kept for auditing purposes.

Management Response: Management agrees with the recommendation and standard operating procedures have been implemented as recommended.




#### Net Assets of the Organization for the last five years:






#### **Background Information:**

The Interim Financial Statements for the seven-month period ending January 31, 2025, are attached for review. Financial Highlights through the month of January 2025 are as follows:


#### 1. School Readiness

The impact of a DEL-mandated School Readiness enrollment pause in November continued to gradually emerge in January with another slight decrease in slot counts. The number of children served fell by 98 from the previous month but expenditures increased by more than \$700K because January had 23 days of care (vs an average of 21.5) including full time care for school aged children on winter break.

School Readiness expenditures for slots have been at historic high levels throughout 2025 after 4 years of expanded funded and open enrollment from the waitlist. New enrollments were re-started at a modest pace in early February following a 3-month pause after DEL confirmed an additional \$6 million in funding for Broward in late January. We are also awaiting news on a request for \$5.9 million more from a pool of funding that other Coalitions will not be able to spend this year. DEL has indicated that they will likely be able to fulfill nearly all of the requests Statewide pending formal authorization by the Department of Education. Depending on the amount of the award, we may be able to ramp up enrollments even more during the 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter. See the charts below, the attached Utilization Projection Report and the Narrative for Amendment #4 for additional detail.




#### **Projected SR Enrollment Trajectory Through FY25 Year End**



#### 2. VPK

VPK services typically ramp up during the first quarter of the fiscal year as the regular school year begins in August. Attendance for school year services in FY25 is comparable to the prior year. Funding is allocated by DEL to match the actual need for services each year.



#### 3. Vulnerable Populations Program

YTD Expenditures in the Children's Services Council-funded Vulnerable Populations Program continued to come in 30% higher than the prior year because of a steady increase in referrals from CSC providers for services, a slower pace of transfers into SR for eligible families as waitlist enrollment has decreased and higher tiered reimbursement rates for child care centers as CLASS scores improve across the County. CSC increased annual funding for the program by \$824K starting in May 2024, but projections show that additional funding will be required to sustain the current pace. Calling children from the SR waitlist starting this month will provide an opportunity to transfer eligible families into School Readiness funding, but the impact will only partially reduce the projected \$2.5 million deficit currently projected. CSC has indicated it will allocate additional funds in the coming months to bring the allocation into alignment with utilization.

#### **Recommended Action:**

In lieu of a quorum at the March 4, 2025 Finance Committee meeting, the Executive Committee Recommends the Board Approve January 2025 Interim Financial Statements, Pending Approval of an Annual Audit Performed by a Qualified Independent Certified Public Accountant.

#### **Background Information:**

In June 2024, the Board approved a preliminary annual budget that reflected estimated revenues and expenditures pending receipt of grant award letters from funders. In September 2024, the Board approved Amendment #1 after the Division of Early Learning (DEL) issued some, but not all, of the expected notices of award for FY2025. In December 2024, they approved Amendment #2 after DEL issued new guidance for Coalitions regarding enrollment. In January 2025, DEL notified Coalitions that new funding allocations were pending, and the Board approved Amendment #3 to reflect this and other changes. In February 2025, DEL indicated that additional SR funding awards were pending for Coalitions that requested it during a recent Statewide deobligation/reobligation process. Amendment #4 requests authority to expend this expected new award and to make other proposed allocation changes.

#### **Current Status:**

Key changes and updates Included in FY2025 Budget Amendment #4 are as follows:

- 1. Up to \$5,911,020 increase to SR base slot funding to be awarded in March or April. The additional funds will permit Broward to accelerate new enrollments from the waitlist currently underway at a modest pace to slow an enrollment decline from a State-mandated enrollment pause, cover Broward's funding shortfall for provider rate differentials (a Statewide issue), and align our child count levels with funding levels expected for FY26. We recently submitted requests for these funds through DEL's Statewide deobligation/reobligation process where funds are pooled and transferred from Coalitions that are projecting surplus. The final amount of the allocation and the notice of award is expected in March or April. 100% of the funding award will be applied toward child care reimbursements.
- 2. \$363,905 in projected cost savings through June 30, 2025 from staff vacancies reallocated as follows:
  - \$75,000 increase in funding for Scholastic Inc. to send packs of children's books to families throughout Broward to encourage literacy and family engagement. The increase will bring the total agreement to \$275,000 for the fiscal year. See separate action statement for the contract amendment in the Executive Committee meeting packet.
  - \$34,875 in funding to replace approximately 30 obsolete laptops on the eligibility team.
  - \$15,000 to pay for family admission to a second annual Day in K event at the Museum of Discovery and Science. Children and their families will have the opportunity to learn all about life as kindergarteners by meeting real teachers, experiencing STEM learning and learning about daily life at school. In FY24 nearly 2,000 future kindergarten learners and their families attended.

- \$1,500 sponsorship for the Healthy Start Coalition of Broward Maternal Health Conference for an outreach booth focused on the Help Me Grow program. See separate action statement for the related party transaction in the Executive Committee meeting packet.
- \$354 for a Special Event liability insurance policy for the BECE conference to provide coverage beyond the 500-person/event limit of our Commercial policy.
- \$237,177 increase to unallocated budget line item to be applied to slots at year-end as needed.

#### 3. \$2.5 Million Projected Shortfall for Vulnerable Populations Program FY25 Contract Year

The CSC-funded Vulnerable Populations continues to see rising enrollment as referrals for service inch upward while transfers to School Readiness decline. At the current pace, staff project that FY25 contract year funding will fall short by approximately \$2.5 million by the September 30, 2025. Staff will work with the CSC to discuss options to remedy this problem in the coming weeks. See utilization projection report attached to the Interim Financial Statement Report for more details.

#### **DEL Proposal for FY26 Funding:**

The legislative session for FY26 funding will begin in March 2025. DEL has requested that the Governor reprise approximately \$120 million for FY26 that was appropriated in FY25 to fill various funding gaps. However, for this year DEL will recommend that the proviso language permit more flexibility for DEL to manage allocations Statewide to avoid the delays and uncertainty we are experiencing this year. DEL is also proposing a \$10 million expansion for the School Readiness funding pool and an \$8 million net increase to funds appropriated for quality rate differentials.

Staff are actively working with legislative contacts to educate about the need to right-size School Readiness base allocations to align with demonstrated need and distribute all funds appropriately across the Coalitions. AELC has made "right-sizing" the system, one of its top legislative priorities.

#### **Recommended Action:**

In lieu of a quorum at the March 4, 2025 Finance Committee meeting, the Executive Committee Recommends that the Board approve FY2025 Budget Amendment #4 Pending Award for Additional School Readiness Base Funding by DEL

#### Background:

Broward's popular Bookworms Program was launched during the Pandemic to promote literacy and reading at home for families with children ages birth through five years. The publisher drop ships age-appropriate books and accompanying activities to any Broward resident family that signs up through the Coalition Website. Parents have the option to keep in touch with the Coalition when they register by agreeing to receive outreach material and updates by email, and we connect them with information on literacy and community partners such as Broward Reads. Since September 2023, more than 10,000 book packs have been shipped to Broward families. We also enhanced the program by launching a "Baby Bookworms" service to families with newborns in collaboration with the Healthy Start Coalition.

In June 2024, the Coalition selected Scholastic to provide these services from July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2024 for up to \$200,000 per year.

#### **Current Status:**

Due to the continued high participation of Broward families in the program, the \$200,000 FY25 annual allocation will be exhausted by March 31, 2025. Staff request to amend the Agreement to add \$75,000 to the budget for the program through June 30, 2025. Funding for FY26 (starting July 1, 2025) will be determined separately in the annual budget process and will be presented at a later date.

#### **Recommended action:**

Executive Committee Recommend the Board Authorize staff to amend the FY25 Agreement with Scholastic Inc. for Broward Bookworms Supply and Shipping Services to increase the total amount of the Agreement by \$75,000 to \$275,000 for services through June 30, 2025 pending legal review





#### **Background Information:**

Help Me Grow® Florida (HMGF), a Division of Early Learning (DEL)-funded program administered by the Children's Forum (the Forum), provides free information for parents on child development and ensures children and families are connected to needed community-based services and supports, when necessary to address developmental and behavioral needs. Working with community partners and child healthcare providers, caregivers are engaged and educated about child development and encouraged to utilize simple developmental and behavioral screenings provided through HMGF. Screening results are analyzed and shared, and referrals are made to appropriate community resources, including Early Steps and FDLRS, when necessary.

The Coalition already provides many of these services to our School Readiness population in Broward, so we applied for annual grant funding to expand our reach to help thousands more families in the broader community engage in their young children's development and behavioral health. In October 2024 the Coalition was awarded \$200,000 to begin operating the program under a contract term running from December 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025.

#### **Current Status:**

After the first three months of startup activities for the program, staff need to request changes to the budget line item allocations to align with the finalized spending plan. The Children's Forum requires those changes to be formalized through a contract amendment that they will send to us in the coming weeks. All of the changes are reallocations, and the total contract amount will not change.

In particular, we propose shifting staff time allocations between individual budgeted staff to reflect the actual level of effort and costs that we project through the remainder of the year for each person. Additionally, we are proposing to update the budgets for travel and outreach expenses between now and June 30 to reflect the actual schedule of events in the final program plan. Lastly, we will add a line item to cover some of the shipping costs required to receive large pallets of outreach materials at our building. (We don't have loading dock at our offices and the landlord requires large pallets to be disassembled and delivered directly to our suite by the freight forwarder). A summary of the proposed revisions are included below:

Ages and Stages Questionnaire®	ASQ	A developmental and social-emotional screening for children from one month to 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. Highly reliable and valid, ASQ looks at strengths and trouble spots, educates parents about developmental milestones, and incorporates parents' expert knowledge about their children.
Association of Early Learning Coalitions	AELC	The Association of Early Learning Coalitions (AELC) is an organization comprised of 31 Early Learning Coalitions throughout the State of Florida. The AELC supports the role of the Early Learning Coalitions to develop and administer a comprehensive school readiness program and voluntary prekindergarten program that prepares preschool children to succeed in school and in life Each Early Learning Coalition's service area is as unique as the population it serves, with some Coalitions serving a single county while others are serving two to seven counties.
Billing Group	BG	An eligibility category that aligns with Chapter 411, Florida Statutes, which describes the different groups or defined categories of children served; a category of direct service costs. The following defines the various billing groups:  **BG1 - At Risk Populations:** School readiness services for a child in a family that is: referred for investigation by the Broward Sheriff's Office (BSO); under the supervision of ChildNet (in home, foster care or relative/no relative placement); in the custody of a parent who is homeless, as verified in law; in the custody of a parent who is the victim of domestic violence, residing in a certified DCF shelter or; actively participating in a diversion program as required by law.  **BG3 - Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), also referred to as Temporary Cash Assistance (TCA)  **Families who are receiving TCA, and subject to the federal work requirements.  **BG3R - Relative Caregiver**  Child who is in receipt of the Relative Caregiver (RCG) payment, who is adjudicated by a Florida court and placed in the home of a relative through ChildNet.  **BG5 - Transitional Child Care (TCC)**  **Family that is transitioning from the receipt of TCA (from a workforce program) into employment, as defined by law.  **BG8 - Income Eligible**  Family that is economically disadvantaged. Parent must meet income and work requirements, which include employment, educational activities or disability.  **CSC - Children's Services Council Vulnerable Populations Program**  Eligibility mirrors the Income Eligible (BG8) criteria. Other conditions may be set by CSC, on an as needed (case-by-case) basis.
Categories Exempt from Licensing		Certain religious affiliated and non-public schools may be exempt from licensure but must register with Broward County and receive approval prior to operating. Programs for children grades six and above and summer day camps for elementary school aged children are exempt from licensure.
Center-Based Child Care Provider		A provider licensed or authorized as license-exempt to provide care and education of children in a nonresidential setting for fewer than 24-hours a day per child.
Child Assessment		An individual assessment performed on each child for the purpose of measuring the child's growth in specific developmental domains. Child care providers who perform this detailed assessment can be reimbursed at a higher rate per child.
		Teaching Strategies Gold (TSG) is one of three ongoing assessment tools that is approved by OEL for child care providers to receive a Quality Performance Incentive Differential. TSG helps teachers observe children during regular everyday activities, plan for their development and assess their needs. Training is needed to become a reliable observer in the tool.
Child Care Development Fund	CCDF	The federal Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) is an aggregate of several funding sources that is distributed in block grants by the federal government to the states and territories. The majority of the funds are to be used to provide child care services to families who meet certain income and need criteria. A portion of the funding (at least 4 percent of the block grant amount) is to be used for activities to improve the quality of child care. Another portion (not to exceed 5 percent of the block grant amount) is to be used to pay for costs of administering the CCDF. The purpose of the CCDF is to increase the availability, affordability, and quality of child care services.
Child Care Development Plan		Every two years, states and territories receiving CCDF funds must prepare and submit to the federal government a plan detailing how these funds will be allocated and expended.

Child Care Licensing		The child care licensing program is a component of the services provided by Department of Children and Families. The program is accountable for the statewide licensure of Florida's child care facilities, specialized child care facilities for the care of mildly ill children, large family child care homes and licensure or registration of family day care homes. The purpose of the program is to ensure a healthy and safe environment for the children in child care settings and to improve the quality of their care through regulation and consultation. The department ensures that licensing requirements are met through on-going inspections of child care facilities and homes, thus preventing the continued operation of substandard child careprograms
Child Care Resource and Referral Program	CCR&R	The Child Care Resource and Referral Network is dedicated to helping families find answers to their questions regarding how to identify quality child care and early education programs. The CCR&R program also conducts a search for providers that meet the specific needs of the family; the CCR&R program also provides information and community resources that may benefit the entire family.
Children's Services Council	CSC	A Children's Services Council is a local government body that oversees funding for programs and services that improve the lives of children and their families. Chapter 125 of Florida Statutes governs the creation and operation of a Children's Services Council, commonly referred to as a CSC. Florida is the only state in the nation that empowers communities to create a local government with the sole purpose of investing in the well-being of families.
Child Development Associate	CDA	A nationally recognized early childhood professional credential awarded to individuals who successfully complete the nationally established requirements of the CDA program to work with young children.
Classroom Assessment Scoring System™	CLASS	The Classroom Assessment Scoring System™ (CLASS™) is an observational tool that provides a common lens and language focused on classroom interactions that boost student learning. This tool is used as the basis for the State of Florida's Quality Rating System, and CLASS scores are used to calculate payment differentials for child care facilities serving subsidized children.
Continuing Education Units	CEUs	A measure used to track continuing education; in general, a CEU is defined as 10 clock hours of participation in a recognized continuing education program with qualified instruction and sponsorship through an accrediting CEU body.
Enhanced Field System Modernization	EFS Mod	The billing system currently in use for early learning programs.
Environment Rating Scales	ERS	The Early Childhood Environment Rating Scales are designed to assess process quality in an early childhood or school age care group. Process quality consists of the various interactions that go on in a classroom between staff and children, staff, parents, and other adults, among the children themselves, and the interactions children have with the many materials and activities in the environment, as well as those features, such as space, schedule and materials that support these interactions. Process quality is assessed primarily through observation and has been found to be more predictive of child outcomes than structural indicators such as staff to child ratio, group size, cost of care, and even type of care, for example child care center or family child care home (Whitebook, Howes & Phillips, 1995).  There are four environment rating scales, each designed for a different segment of the early childhood

Federal Poverty Guidelines	FPL	The set minimum amount of gross income that a family needs for food, clothing, transportation, shelter and other necessities. In the United States, this level is determined by the Department of Health and Human Services. FPL varies according to family size. The number is adjusted for inflation and reported annually in the form of poverty guidelines. Public assistance programs, such as Medicaid in the U.S., define eligibility income limits as some percentage of FPL. The poverty guidelines are typically issued every February and correspond to the year in which they are issued.

The FLKRS assessment is the Star Early Literacy®, which is an online, adaptive instrument that students complete independently in approximately 15-20 minutes. The assessment covers 3 main domains: Word Knowledge and Skills, Comprehension Strategies and Constructing meaning, and Numbers and Operations.

Florida Child Care Professional Credential	FCCPC	Florida Child Care Professional Credential (FCCPC)," pursuant to Section 402.305(3)(b), F.S., is a DCF approved training program that consists of a minimum of 120 hours of early childhood instruction, 480 contact hours with children ages birth through eight (8) and at least two (2) methods of formal assessment that offers two (2) areas of certification; "Birth Through Five (formerly the department approved CDA Equivalency training programs)" and "School-Age (formerly the Florida School-Age Certification)."
Florida Department of Children and Families	DCF	A state agency of Florida. The Department provides social services to children, adults, refugees, domestic violence victims, human trafficking victims, the homeless community, child care providers, disabled people, and the elderly.
Florida Department of Economic Opportunity	DEO	A state agency of Florida. The Department promotes economic opportunities for Floridians through workforce, community, and economic development strategies.
Florida Department of Education	DOE	A state agency of Florida. The Department governs public education and manages funding and testing for local educational agencies (school boards).
Florida Department of Health	DOH	A cabinet level agency of the state government, headed by a state surgeon general who reports to the governor. The Department is responsible for protecting the public health and safety of the residents and visitors of the state of Florida.
Florida Office of Early Learning	OEL	The Office of Early Learning is the lead agency for the administration of state and federal child care funds and partners with 31 Early Learning Coalitions, the Redlands Christian Migrant Association, and others to deliver a comprehensive early learning system of services statewide.
Florida Sunshine Law		The "Sunshine Amendment," adopted by Florida voters through a constitutional initiative in 1976 as Article II, Section 8, Florida Constitution, contains standards of ethical conduct and disclosures applicable to public officers and employees; it also requires the Legislature to adopt the code of ethics (see Code of Ethics definition above).
Gold Seal		In 1996, the Florida Legislature established the Gold Seal Quality Care program to acknowledge child care facilities and family day care homes that are accredited by nationally recognized agencies and whose standards reflect quality in the level of care and supervision provided to children. In addition, the Legislature established provisions for Gold Seal providers participating in the subsidized child care program, a.k.a. school readiness and early Learning, to receive a higher reimbursement per child, than providers not receiving a Gold Seal designation.
		In 1999, the Legislature revised the program to provide tax incentives through the Department of Revenue or county tax appraiser for participating in the Gold Seal Quality Care Program. Since then, the Legislature has revised the maximum amount of the reimbursement. Currently, the rate differential cannot exceed 20% above the reimbursement rate established by the local early learning coalition, a.k.a. the local school readiness coalition.

Individual Education Plan	IEP	The plan for individualizing the education of a child over age three with a disability that includes measureable goals and documentation of the child's progress.
Individual Family Service Plan	IFSP	A plan for special services for young children (under three) with disabilities and their families that includes individualized supports and services that will enhance the child's development.
Infant and Toddler Program		The provision of activities to foster brain development in infants and toddlers.
Informal Child Care		Any legal but non-regulated child care, subject to health and safety requirements, that is provided by relative or non-relative in the child's home or other location.
Licensed Family Child Care Home	FCCH	An individual that provides child care for fewer than 24 hours a day per child, as sole caregiver, in a private residence other than the child's home and meets the state and/or local family child care licensing requirements.
Licensed Large Family Child Care Provider		Two or more people that provide child care for fewer than 24 hours a day per child in a private residence other than the child's home and meet the state and/or local licensing requirements for large family child care homes.

Match		Refers to a statutorily specified percentage of program or project costs that must be contributed by an entity in order to be eligible for State or Federal funding; the value of third-party in-kind contributions and that portion of project or program costs not borne by the State or Federal government
Market Rate		The price that a child care provider charges for daily, weekly, or monthly child care services.
Office of Child Care	осс	The Office of Child Care (OCC) supports low-income working families by providing access to affordable, high-quality early care and afterschool programs. OCC administers the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) and works with state, territory and tribal governments to provide support for children and their families juggling work schedules and struggling to find child care programs that will fit their needs and that will prepare children to succeed in school. The Office of Child Care was established in September 2010 and replaces the former Child Care Bureau. The Office of Child Care partners with states, territories, and tribes to administer the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) program.
Other Cost Accumulator	OCA	OCA is a cost accounting system to maintain the collection of costs in an organized and systematic manner.
Professional Development Initiative	PD	A continuum of learning and support activities designed to prepare individuals for work with and on behalf of young children and their families, as well as ongoing experiences to enhance this work, leading to improvements in knowledge, skills, practices, and dispositions.
Performance Funding Project	PFP	In 2014, the Florida Legislature created the Early Learning Performance Funding Project (ELPFP). It was designed to provide performance based funding for School Readiness providers that demonstrate improved: program quality, teacher-child interactions and/or child outcomes. The ELPFP has demonstrated a significant and positive effect on early childhood program quality and child outcomes among at-risk children and the teachers who support them.
Quality Initiatives	QI	Activities that enhance early learning environments and experiences.
Quality Improvement Plan	QIP	A plan created for providers that do not meet the quality threshold as set by rule 6M-4.741 Program Assessment Threshold Requirements for the School Readiness Program. The plan includes 1 to 2 targeted strategies.
Quality Rating and Improvement System	QRIS	A systematic approach to assessing, supporting, improving, and communicating the level of quality in an early care and education setting. The State of Florida currently utilizes CLASS scores as its only measurement of quality in this system, and assesses whether a child care provider can contract with an ELC to provide care to subsidized children on this. The QRIS system also uses CLASS scores to reimburse child care providers on a scale. Child care providers with higher CLASS scores receive higher reimbursement rates.
Registered Family Child Care Provider		An individual that provides child care for fewer than 24 hours a day per child, as sole caregiver, in a private residence other than the child's home and meets the state and/or local registered family child care requirements.
Religious Exemption		A child care facility which is an integral part of church or parochial schools conducting regularly scheduled classes, courses of study, or educational programs accredited by, or by a member of, an organization which publishes and requires compliance with its standards for health, safety, and sanitation. Such facilities shall meet minimum requirements of the applicable local governing body as to health, sanitation, and safety and shall meet the screening requirements pursuant to ss. 402.305 and 402.3055. Failure by a facility to comply with such screening requirements shall result in the loss of the facility's exemption from licensure.
School-Age Child Care Provider		A provider licensed or authorized as license-exempt to provide care and education of children who are at least 5 years of age by Sept 1 of the beginning of the school year and who attends kindergarten through grade 5.
School Readiness Program		The School Readiness Act, Chapter 411.01 of the Florida Statutes, School readiness programs are to be full-day, year-round to the maximum extent possible, to enable parents to work and become financially self-sufficient.
Teacher Education and Compensation Helps	T.E.A.C.H.	A scholarship program, which provides educational scholarships and financial incentives to caregivers and administrators of early childhood programs, family day care homes, and large family child care homes.
Temporary Assistance for Needy Families	TANF	Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) is one of the federal assistance programs. It began on July 1, 1997, and succeeded the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) program, providing cash assistance to indigent American families with dependent children. This cash benefit is often referred to simply as "welfare." TANF was created by the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Act instituted in 1996. The Act provides temporary financial assistance while aiming to get people off of that assistance, primarily through employment. The reform granted states wide discretion of how to distribute TANFentitlements.
Utilization Report		This is a management tool that is system which provides year to date expenditures of dollars by category. This data allows for funding projections, based on actual, projected and historical data, to determine if spending is on target or if adjustments may be needed.

Voluntary Prekindergarten Program	VPK	A constitutional amendment passed by Florida's voters in Nov. 2002, required a voluntary prekindergarten program for all four-year-old children. VPK is a program designed to prepare four-year-olds for kindergarten and build the foundation for their educational success. The program allows a parent to enroll his or her eligible child (four years old by September 1 and residing in Florida) in a free VPK program. The program is voluntary for children and providers.
Wait List		"Waiting list" means a list of children waiting for potential enrollment in the school readiness program once funding is available. The list is a record of the names of parent(s), the names and dates of birth of their children, waiting list date and anticipated eligibility and priority category for seeking school readiness services.
